SCHOOL DISTRICT LINES: A CASE HISTORY by KEN EFTINK, PPM

Missouri mappers often find themselves reestablishing boundary lines that greatly affect individual lives and entire communities. All too often these lines are not based on accurate written descriptions but the mapper's interpretation of old plats, maps, and drawings. The boundary lines referred to are school district boundary lines. The purpose of this article is to share one County's experience with a recent court case that went before the Circuit Court and then to the Missouri Court of Appeals. It will include a review of how our current school district's lines were established, how they change, facts considered by the Courts, and some common sense ideas for reestablishing school district lines.

To the average person, the precise location of a school district line is not a particular concern, but when the daddy of a high school cheerleader who is also a candidate for prom queen comes in to talk to you because you say she is going to the wrong school, believe me, you have a life threatening situation on your hands.

To the local school board, the school district line has a different meaning. The district line does two things. Number one, it establishes the total area from which the district is able to receive tax revenue. Number two, is establishes the area from which they are able to draw students. These two elements are crucial for the survival of the district.

I would like to share a little story with you about how critical the location of the school district line can be for generating tax revenue.

Our County was fortunate enough to have a major industry locate in a rural area. The industry came in and constructed a new building which put about 40 acres under roof. The building contained offices, production lines, and warehouse space. The assessed value on the property generated a substantial amount of revenue for the taxing entities. As fate would have it, the building was located in the vicinity of the boundary line between two school districts. Both school districts felt like they had a claim to the industry. To make a long story short, the two school districts went to court to settle the issue.

This incident took place prior to reassessment so the assessor and the Court did not have access to aerial photographs and parcel maps. A great deal of research was done to establish the precise location of the district line and, sure enough, the line split through the building. Surveyors were sent out to prepare a plat delineating exactly where the line went through the building and the total square footage in each district. The assessor took the plat and determined the proper valuation for each district.

As mappers, we are dedicated to creating maps that accurately show school district lines. The office for which most mappers work is required by Missouri State Statute to determine each taxing district a parcel is in. A single parcel is in a number of overlapping districts such as school, library, fire, road, and drainage districts. Many times the value of a parcel is affected by the districts in which it is located.

The lines we reestablish often times are the starting point for all the tax data generated on a parcel. Many people rely on the quality of our work and we take pride in what we do. We know that many of the maps we create today will still be referred to long after we are gone just as the maps we pulled from the dungeons of the courthouse and scrutinized with a magnifying glass were created by our ancestors.

The County hired a mapping contractor to prepare orthophoto base maps and parcel map overlays for reassessment. A great deal of information was provided to the contractor including the existing tax roll and a county plat map with the school district boundaries outlines on it. The County contained all or portions of seven different school districts. The mapping contractor was to delineate the school districts lines on the new parcel maps. As the contractor started to prepare the maps, he ran into discrepancies between the tax roll and the County school district map. Further review of the information indicated that neither the school district map nor the tax toll could be used to determine the location of the school district line. It became apparent that other sources of information were going to have to be found in order to reestablish the school district lines.

The County mapping department set out on a factfinding mission to gather the information necessary to reestablish the district lines. We searched the Courthouse for any documents we could find relating to the schools. We also contacted the school districts for any information they had and we visited the State Board of Education in Jefferson City to review their files on the subject. What we discovered was that there was no one reliable source that could tell us where the lines were located. Instead we found pieces of information covering a 100-year time span that had to be compiled to recreate the school district boundary line.
