WHAT IS THE MISSOURI MAPPERS ASSOCIATION?

The Missouri Mappers Association is a non-profit organization. Its purpose is to bring together those persons concerned with property mapping in state and local governments and private industry, and to create a framework in which we may cooperate in the investigation, study, discussion, and recommendation of improvements in property mapping and land record management, to promote the interchange of ideas and experiences, to improve the practice of property mapping and knowledge through education and training, and to support legislation beneficial to property mappers and land record management.

To achieve these objectives, the Association sponsors regional workshops and courses, publishes a quarterly newsletter, and has instituted a professional designation program.

MMA operates from a constitution and a set of by-laws. The Association has an Executive committee comprised of a President, Immediate Past President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, and two Directors. These officers are selected each year at the Annual Meeting with the exception of the Treasurer and the Directors who each serve a two-year term of office.

Each year, the President appoints several standing committees. These include Annual Meeting, Awards, Certification, Education, Legislation, Membership, Publication, Historical, and CADD.

The Annual Meeting Committee overseas all of the many responsibilities for the annual membership meetings. They endeavor to provide the membership with an enlightening, rewarding, and entertaining gathering.

The Awards Committee has the difficult task of choosing the recipients for the awards which are presented each year at the Annual Meeting.

The Certification Committee is responsible for administrating the Professional Missouri Mapper designation program. To acquire designation, candidates must have a certain amount of experience and education, and complete a comprehensive mapping examination.

The Education Committee works to furnish educational opportunities by providing regional workshops which are held several times each year throughout the state.

The Legislation Committee keeps apprised of any current legislation involving mapping and informs the membership of such. Members are on occasion asked to notify their legislators in support of or opposition to proposed legislation.

The Membership Committee is constantly working to bring new members into the organization. They maintain the membership records and publish a membership directory annually.

The Publication Committee produces the MMA NEWS, a quarterly newsletter which contains informative, educational, and entertaining tidbits.

The CADD (Computer Assisted Drafting and Design) Committee promotes the use of CADD, and assists with training programs on the use of computerized data in the mapping profession.

The Historical Committee is responsible for accumulating information about MWA and for preserving these records for future memberships.

DESCRIPTION OF SPEAKERS

Workshop Speaker: Julie Bay on "Highway Right of Ways". Julie is a graduate of Williams Woods
University with a Bachelor's Degree in Paralegal Studies. She has six years of paralegal
experience with private law firms handling real estate transactions. She also has two years of
paralegal experience with MoDot. Julie has been employed with District 5 (Jefferson City area)
of the Right of Way Division since September of 1998 ordering title work, writing legal
descriptions, and preparing deeds.

About <u>Highway Right of Ways</u>: It is a basic explanation of highway stationing, design symbols, and simple curves. Basically, she will try to explain our highway plans and how they coincide with your county maps.

Keynote Speaker: Bob Norris

- Speaker 1: Scott Tab on "Railroad Abandonment". Scott Tab, PKM, has been working in county and state government since 1987 when he started with the Cass County Assessor's Office. After moving to Kansas in 1989, he worked in Douglas County and then the Kansas Department of Revenue, Division of Property Valuation. While working for the Division of Property Valuation, he taught numerous mapping courses and was involved with implementing GIS at the Department of Revenue. Scott currently works for Shafer, Kline & Warren, Inc. as a GIS Consultant. He is current President of the Kansas Association of Mappers (KAM) and has earned the KAM Professional Kansas Mapper designation.

 About Railroad Abandonment: This session will cover the impact the "Rails to Trails Act" has on property ownership mapping. All pertinent session of the act will be covered.
- Speaker 2: Scott Tab on "Using a Land Compass". (See above for personal information.)

 About <u>Using a Land Compass</u>: The basic principles of using a land compass will be examined.

 We will discuss field angles, bearings, and reverse bearings.
- Speaker 3: Gil Restrepo on "Stretching the Truth". Since 1983, Gil has been a Cartographer with Revenue Technical Services, a division of the Department of Revenue at St. Louis County Government. He participated in the conversion of "ink on Mylar" Assessor's map base into a CAD (Computer Aided Drafting) system. Gil has experienced Intergraph's evolution from VAX/VMS to UNIX to Microstation and then to Windows NT. Today, he is part of the team responsible for conflating the St. Louis County Assessor's map base. Gil has Bachelor of Arts (BA) and Master of Science (BS) degrees from Southern Illinois at Edwardsville (1983). When not conflating, he participates in soccer and listens to music (Santana).

About <u>Stretching the Truth</u>: The current St. Louis County Assessor's map base had it's origin in the 1960's. Using rectified aerial photography, highways, primary roads, and drainage features were inked on linen and later transferred to Mylar sheets covering an area of 5,000 by 7,500 feet at 1"-200'. Cadastal information from the Assessor's plat pages (at different scales) was transferred (inked) to the 453 Mylar maps. Subsequently, new subdivision, combinations, splits, r.o.w.'s changes, zoning lines, and other jurisdictional lines were added.

In 1983, the transfer (digitizing) began of the Assessor's map base into an Intergraph Corp. VAXVMS computer aided drafting (CAD) system. It is common knowledge that map bases generated like this one inherit all the errors (human and mechnical) associated with manual drafting. Since the mid 1980's, St. Louis County's Revenue Technical Services (RTS), who is in charge of maintaining the Assessor's map base, has been requested funding for a new map base or at least for orthophotography. The high cost of acquiring either one has forced RTS to maintain a map base system where accuracy has been greatly compromised, particularly in the western and southern areas of the county.

The Metropolitan St. Louis Sewer District (MSD), a long time user of the Assessor's map base, has also realized the need for a more accurate map base for their facilities management.

DESCRIPTION OF SPEAKERS

"Stretching the Truth" is a review of RTS' experience in Phase One of the CONFLATION Project. A joint venture between MSD and RTS to build a geodetically accurate map base that can be used with confidence by all public agencies. The conflation of existing parcel lined with a map base consisting of right-of-way lines, newly digitized from orthophotos, have created new challenges for RTS; while eliminating some ground truth errors, the shifting of parcel lines have generated new ones

MISSOURI STATE FACTS

- The Great Seal of Missouri: The Great Seal was designed by Judge Robert William Wells and adopted by the Missouri General Assembly on January 11, 1822. The center of the state seal is composed of two parts. On the right is the United States coat-of-arms containing the bald eagle. In its claws are arrows and olive branches, signifying that the power of war and peace lies with the U.S. federal government. On the left side of the shield, the state side, are the grizzly bear and a silver crescent moon. The crescent symbolizes Missouri at the time of the state seal's creation, a state of a small population and wealth which would increase like the new or crescent moon; it also symbolizes the "second son," meaning Missouri was the second state formed out of the Louisiana Territory.

The shield is encircled by a belt inscribed with the motto, "United we stand, divided we fall," which indicates Missouri's advantage as a member of the United States. The two grizzlies on either side of the shield symbolize the state's strength and its citizens' bravery. The bears stand atop a scroll bearing the **state motto**, "Salus Populi Suprema Lex Esto," which means, "Let the welfare of the people be the supreme law." Below this scroll are the Roman numerals for 1820, the year Missouri began its functions as a state.

The helmet above the shield represents state sovereignty, and the large star atop the helmet surrounded by 23 smaller stars signifies Missouri's status as the 24th state. The cloud around the large star indicates the problems Missouri had becoming a state. The whole state seal is enclosed by a scroll bearing the words, "The Great Seal of the State of Missouri."

- The State Flag: Nearly 100 years after achieving statehood, Missouri adopted an official flag on March 22, 1913. The flag was designed by the late Mrs. Marie Elizabeth Watkins Oliver, wife of former State Senator R.B. Oliver. The flag consists of three horizontal stripes of red, whir, and blue. These represent valor, purity, and justice. In the center white stripe is the Missouri coat-of-arms, circled by a blue band containing 24 stars, denoting that Missouri was the 24th state.
- The State Song: The "Missouri Waltz" became the state song under an act adopted by the General Assembly on June 30, 1949. The song came from a melody by John V. Eppel and was arranged by Frederic Knight Logan, using lyrics written by J.R. Shannon. First Published in 1914, the song did not sell well and was considered a failure. By 1939, the song had gained popularity and six million copies had been sold. Sales increased substantially after Missourian Harry S. Truman became president, and it was reported that the "Missouri Waltz" was his favorite song.
- Missouri Day: On March 22, 1915, the 48th General Assembly set aside the first Monday in October each year as "Missouri Day," due to the efforts of Mrs. Anna Brosius Korn, a native Missourian. In 1969, the 75th General Assembly changed the date to the third Wednesday in October. Missouri Day is a time for schools to honor the state and for the people of the state to celebrate the achievements of all Missourians.

- How Missouri was Named: Father Jacques Marquette, accompanying explorer Louis Joliet, traveled down the Mississippi River in 1673. During the trip he wrote, "We descend following the course of the river, toward another called Pekitanoui, which empties into the Mississippi, coming from the northwest." Although he called the river "Pekitanoui" a name apparently given to him by the Sauk Indians he noted on his map that a large tribe of Indians called the OuMissouri lived upstream. The name had been given to them by their enemies, the Fox tribe of Algonquins, and in the Fox language means "people with big canoes." The Missouris, a branch of Sioux, called the river Nishodse, which means "muddy water." Later, when settlers came, the vast area the river drained (extending westward to the Rocky Mountains) became known as the Missouri Territory. In 1812, when the new state was formed in this territory, it adopted the name MISSOURI.

The name of this organization shall be the Missouri Mappers Association. It's purpose is to bring together those persons concerned with property mapping in the state and local governments and private industry without regard to the unit of government or department in which such persons perform their duties. The Association shall be non-profit and any dues or other funds shall be used to further the objectives of the Association.

ARTICLE I Objectives

<u>Section 1</u> To create a frame work in which the various governmental units of Missouri and others may cooperate in the investigation, study, discussion, and recommendation of improvement in property mapping and land record management.

<u>Section 2</u> To provide a forum in which officials of various agencies of state and local governments and others concerned with property mapping may address common problem's.

<u>Section 3</u> To provide a means whereby property mappers and other interested in property mapping may interchange ideas and experiences and obtain advice.

<u>Section 4</u> To advance property mapping knowledge and practice through education.

<u>Section 5</u> To encourage a high standard of experience as a means to more effectively serve the public.

<u>Section 6</u> To work toward the improvement of the technical quality of property maps available to the government.

<u>Section 7</u> To support legislation beneficial to property mappers and land record management.

ARTICLE II Membership

<u>Section 1</u> Regular Members: Mappers, mapping supervisors, department heads in charge of mapping, and those directly involved shall be entitled to regular membership.

<u>Section 2</u> Subscribing Members: Persons or firms not eligible for regular membership, that are interested in property mapping.

<u>Section 3</u> Student Members: Students at a university, college, trade or other equally recognizable school, not eligible for regular membership, that are interested in property mapping.

<u>Section 4</u> Rejection: The right to reject any application for membership is hereby reserved for the Executive Committee.

<u>Section 5</u> Voting Rights: The right to hold office and vote is open to all members in good standing, with the exception of student members.

<u>Section 6</u> Transfer of Membership: Whenever the dues of a member are paid by the employer, and the member resigns, retires or other wise vacates the position during the period for which the dues have been paid; the membership may be transferred to the successor upon receipt of written notice to the Association by said employer.

ARTICLE III Officers

<u>Section 1</u> Selection: At each annual meeting there shall be elected for the term of one (1) year, by the membership in good standing who are present, a President, a Vice-President, and a Secretary. The Treasurer and two (2) Directors shall be elected for a term of two (2) years, by the membership in good standing who are present, with one (1) Director being elected each year. Beginning in 1988, one (1) Director shall be elected for a full two (2) year term and one (1) Director shall be elected for a half, one (1) year term. One Director shall be elected each year therafter, so that the terms of the Directors shall be staggered.

Section 2 Executive Committee Members: The Executive Committee shall consist of the President, the Immediate Past President, Secretary, Treasurer, and Directors. The President shall be the chairperson of the Executive Committee and may call a committee together in the interest of the Association at his or her discretion or upon written request of three (3) committee members. The governing body of the Association shall be the Executive Committee and it shall have the power to pass any resolution or bylaw it may deem necessary to accomplish the objectives of the Association which is not in conflict with any of the provisions of this constitution or resolutions or bylaws adopted in meeting of the Association. The Executive Committee shall approve the budgets for all committees, and these budgets shall not exceed without the approval of the Executive Committee.

<u>Section 3</u> Quorum: For the purpose of transacting official business, a quorum of the Executive Committee shall consist of not less than four (4) members thereof.

<u>Section 4</u> Vacancy of Offices: Whenever a vacancy in the Executive Committee shall occur, the Nominating Committee shall appoint a voting member in good standing to fill the vacancy, who shall serve until the next annual meeting, provided when a vacancy occurs in the office of the President, the Vice-President, shall immediately succeed thereto.

<u>Section 5</u> Compensation: Officers and Directors shall serve without compensation, except the reasonable expense to attend special meetings, may be approved by the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE IV Duties of Officers

<u>Section 1</u> President: The President shall be the Chairperson, and preside at all general association meetings and executive meetings and executive committee meetings, or designate the Vice-President, in his or her absence or another member of the Executive Committee. The President shall have power to appoint regular or special committees as he or she may deem necessary.

<u>Section 2</u> Vice-President: The Vice-President shall exercise all the powers and duties of the President during his or her absence or inability to act and shall perform such other duties as may be assigned by the Executive Committee. The Vice-President shall also act as coordinator of the Standing Committee.

<u>Section 3</u> Secretary: The Secretary shall keep roll of all members of the Association and a true up-to-date record of all proceedings of the Association and meeting of the Executive Committee, subject to the inspection and approval of the Executive Committee, which shall be turned over to his or her immediate successor in office.

Section 4 Treasurer: The Treasurer shall be the chief financial agent of the Association and shall exercise such authority and perform such duties of the Association as may be prescribed by the Executive Committee. The Treasurer shall have custody of all funds, securities, and legal instruments of the Association and shall be responsible for their safekeeping. To this end the Treasurer may, subject to approval of the Executive Committee, determine the place and manner of depositing and safekeeping of such funds, securities, and legal instruments. A correct account of all receipts and distributions must be kept and a complete up-to-date report submitted at each annual meeting. The Executive Committee shall have full rights to examine and cause an audit to be made at any time.

<u>Section 5</u> Directors: The Directors shall help guide the Association to achieve its objectives by their involvement in the Executive Committee. They shall serve on the Executive Committee with the same voting rights as the other officers.

ARTICLE V Nomination & Elections

<u>Section 1</u> Nominations & Elections: The President shall appoint each year a Nomination Committee consisting of three (3) voting members in good standing who shall select at least one (1) name from the membership, in good standing, as a candidate for each office and make the necessary report at each annual meeting.

<u>Section 2</u> Additional nominations for each office may be made from the floor at any annual meeting, by any voting member in good standing.

Section 3 Officers shall be elected by majority vote at the annual meeting.

ARTICLE VI Meetings

<u>Section 1</u> The Association shall hold its annual General meetings at which time the election and installation of officers shall take place. The Executive Committee shall have authority to call special meetings at such time as it deems necessary.

<u>Section 2</u> Notice: Notice of the annual and any special meetings shall be given to all members by mail, not less than 15 days prior to such meetings. Notice shall state the date, time and place of the meeting, along with an agenda of business to be conducted.

<u>Section 3</u> Quorum: Any business, including the election of officers, can be transacted by a majority of the voting membership in good standing who are present.

ARTICLE VII Amendments

<u>Section 1</u> This constitution may be amended by a majority vote of all voting members in good standing present and voting at the annual meeting, provided that notice and a copy of any proposed amendment shall have been sent to all members by mail, not less than fifteen (15) days prior to such meetings.

<u>Section 2</u> All proposed amendments shall be submitted to the Executive Committee for its review, no later than 60 days in advance of the annual meeting.

ARTICLE VIII Definition of "PROPERTY MAPPING"

PROPERTY MAPPING is the compilation or representation of cadastral information form the primary sources of deeds, surveys, plats, and base maps for the purpose of creating a graphic representation of land ownership, within a governmental unit for assessments, zoning or other purposes.

The information developed from property mapping may be used as a basis for further investigation into primary sources of deeds, plats, and surveys, but does not serve as a substitute for the primary sources of cadastral mapping.

THE MISSOURI MAPPERS ASSOCIATION BYLAWS

1. Committees

The following committees shall be appointed by the President each year.

2. Annual Dues

The annual dues shall be \$15.00 for regular members, \$25.00 for subscribing members, and \$5.00 for student members.

3. Time of Annual Meeting

The Association's Annual Meeting shall be held at the discretion of the Executive Committee.

4. Fiscal Year

The Association's Fiscal Year shall begin August 1 and close on July 31 of each year.

5. Approve of Expenditures

All Association expenditures shall be approved by the President and Treasurer.

6. Chapters

The Association, with the approval of it's Board of Directors, may authorize and chapter local chapters, consolidate chapters or revoke chapter charters for good cause. Chapters shall coextensive in geographical area, application for the charter of a chapter shall be in writing, signed by not fewer than ten (10) members in good standing, and shall be submitted to the Board of Directors of the Missouri Mappers Association for it's approval.

Such local chapters may provide for their internal government and regulations by Bylaws which shall not be in conflict with the Constitution and Bylaws of the Association and which shall be submitted to the Board of Directors of the Association for it's approval.

Each local chapter is required to have it's chairperson or a chapter member, as designated by the chairperson of such chapter, in attendance at each quarterly meeting and give a report to the Board of Directors,

7. Amendments

These Bylaws may be amended by vote of the Executive Committee, as provided by Article III, Section 2, of the Constitution.

PROFESSIONAL MISSOURI MAPPERS (PMM) DESIGNATION PROGRAM OUTLINE REVISED: 1992

A. Introduction

"A profession is a body of people who carry on their work in accordance with rules designed to enforce certain standards both for the protection of its members and for better service to the public." Mapping, like other professions, requires special study, knowledge, and skill. The Missouri Mappers Association has instituted a program design to raise the professional standards of mapping personnel, and recognize those superior skills. The professional designation outlined is a result of this effort.

Attainment of the Professional Missouri Mapper (PMM) Designation is a true challenge. In addition to ability, it requires a substantial amount of study and knowledge. Those who achieve this difficult goal should be very proud; there are some who will fail. Yet, if this were not so, the designation would not be worth the time, effort, and patience required to attain it.

B. Objectives

Realizing that the fair and equitable administration of property mapping requires a high level of competence in many areas, the Missouri Mappers Association has instituted the PMM designation. The PMM Designation is designed for those professionals who are engaged in the use, production, or maintenance of cadastral maps.

The program is designed to raise the standards of the mapping profession, to attain recognition by governmental authorities and the public of the mapping profession, and to gain for members recognition as qualified, objective and competent mapping professionals.

C. Administration

The PMM program is administered by the Professional Certification Committee. This committee will be made up of Professional Missouri Mappers in good standing, consisting of a Chairman appointed by the President of the Missouri Mappers Association and 4 members appointed by the Chairman. If the board liaison is a PMM he or she may serve on this committee as one of the 4 members. The duties of the Professional Certification Committee are to prescribe the policy regarding the applicant's requirements, to screen all applicants, to prepare suitable examinations, and to recommend to the Executive Board individuals qualified to receive the Professional Designation.

D. Candidate Application Requirements for the PMM Designation

- 1. Applicant Must be a member in good standing of the Missouri Mappers Association and must make formal application candidacy. These applications are available from the Committee Chairman.
- Applicant must submit a candidacy application form with appropriate fee.

E. PMM Designation Requirements

To qualify as a Professional Missouri Mapper a person shall complete all of the requirements listed below. The minimum requirements for PMM designation are:

- 1. Have five (5) full years if cadastral mapping experience or it's equivalent.
- 2. Be engaged in the use, production or maintenance of maps.

- 3. Attended a minimum of 30 hours of study in mapping, surveying or a closely-related subject.
- 4. Successfully complete a certification examination which will be established and revised when necessary by the Certification Committee.

F. Certification Examination

A validated examination is necessary to test the applicant's knowledge of cadastral mapping principles and techniques. The examination for PMM requires seven hours to complete and is composed of three parts briefly described as follows:

Part I (1 hour & 15 minutes)

A 90 question comprehensive, multiple choice and true/false test that will test your general knowledge of mapping worth 100 points.

Part II (4 hours & 30 minutes)

A 16 question, 200 point compilation exercise designed to test your analytical and technical abilities.

Part III (1 hour & 15 minutes)

A 50 point inking exercise designed to test you craftsmanship and skill.

A score of 70% or 245 points out of the possible 350 shall be required to pass.

The examination may only be taken once within any 12 month period only after all other requirements have been met. It may be given in more than one location on the same day depending on the need and location of applicants. The time and locations will be determined by the Certification Committee. Efforts will be made to give the examination in location convenient to the candidates.

G. Awarding the Designation

The candidate shall assert by affidavit that if designated he or she will abide by the MMA bylaws and the requirements of the Professional Missouri Mappers Program. After the candidate completes all requirements for the Professional Designation, the Executive Board on the recommendation of the Certification Committee, will award the appropriate designation.

H. Evidence of Designation

Each PMM designee will receive a certificate of designation issued by the MMA as approved by the Executive Board.

PROFESSIONAL MISSOURI MAPPERS (PMM) DESIGNATION PROGRAM OUTLINE REVISED: 1992

I. Use of the Professional Designation - PMM

Members of the Missouri Mappers Association who have been awarded the PMM Designation may identify themselves by their designation. PMM is the abbreviation for the word Professional Missouri Mapper (it should be noted that the abbreviations do not have periods between the letters). In the event that the designation of an individual is terminated by resignation, expulsion of for any other reason and also during any period that an individual's privileges of membership or designation are suspended for any reason the individual shall refrain from using or displaying the designation PMM.

The PMM Certification of Designation and other such evidence of the designation issued at any time to a member of the Missouri Mappers Association, shall remain the permanent property of the Missouri Mappers Association and must be returned to the Executive Board of the individual to whom such materials are issued is suspended or terminated for any reason.

J. Maintaining Certification

In order to maintain a high level of professionalism, it is necessary for professional designees to keep abreast of the ever changing mapping field. In order to maintain the PMM designation, the following will be necessary:

- 1. Maintain active membership on the Missouri Mappers Association.
- Accumulate a minimum of 10 points within a 12 month period and keep a record format designation by the Certification Committee in accordance with the <u>PMM CERTIFICATION</u> REQUIREMENTS.
